### Summer School



# ELEMENTARY CURRICULUM

### Kindergarten

- Math: write numbers to 30, count to 100, 3D shapes, place value
- ELA: Identifying middle sounds in words, reading at a DRA level 3
- Writing: Opinion writing in full sentences in journal
- Science: Weather, oceans, dental health
- Social Studies: Interpret maps/graphs, wants vs needs



- Math: teen solutions methods, find patterns and relationships, represent and compare data, compare problem types, tell and write time, shapes and equal shares, measure and order by length, and add two digit numbers.
- ELA: subject pronouns, pronouns *I and me*, possessive pronouns, indefinite pronouns, contractions, exclamations, kinds of sentences, adjectives, adverbs, and adjectives that compare.
- Science: Sky patterns
- Social Studies: Rules and Laws



- Math: This is where we practice on 2-digit and 3-digit addition and subtraction regrouping skills. Units on money, time, and graphs are explored more.
- ELA: Phonemic Awareness, Phonics, Vocabulary, sight words. Writing: research, opinion, and fictional writing. Reading: answering an essential question.
- Science: Earth's surfaces like water and land, changes throughout the years.
- Social Studies: being citizens and the impact we have on communities.
- Character Education: work on our own behaviors and learn the rewards and consequences of choices.

# ELEMENTARY CURRICULUM



- Math: perimeter and area, fractions and how to tell which fractions are equivalent, and telling time to the nearest minute on an analog clock.
- ELA: , prefixes, suffixes, words with ~ing endings, adverbs, possessive nouns and pronouns. **Reading**: story structure, comparing and con-trasting, sequencing events, identifying the author's purpose. Writ-ing: planning, drafting, editing, and making a final draft to create a fictional narrative.
- Science: the life cycle of a frog, heredity and basic traits passed from parents to children.
- Social Studies: government in Michigan and how they can do their part as Michigan citizens.

# Fourth Grade

- Math: measurement, fractions & decimals, and geometry
- ELA: practice various reading skills & strategies they have learned throughout the year, expanding their vocabulary and comparing & contrasting the stories they read, and applying grammar and punctuation skills to their writing.
- Science: the earth's changing surface
- Social studies: US government and responsibilities of citizenship.



- Math: Students will be learning how to Multiply & Divide Whole numbers and decimals.
- ELA: Perfect tense, Verb "be & have", Contractions, Possessive Nouns, Commas and Punctuations. **Reading**: Word Choice, Visual Elements, Main Idea, Supporting details and Analysis. **Writing**: Editorials, Response to Literature, Persuasive Arguments and Informational Writing.
- Science: Changes in Matter
- Social Studies: Women's History, Civil War and Reconstruction.

# ELEMENTARY CURRICULUM



Lower elementary students will continue to work on gluing, cutting and coloring skills with emphasis on symbols, culture and environment and personal experiences. Recent projects include character trait flags incorporating emojis to describe personal traits, mosaic monograms for students first names, and using the solar eclipse to making art!

During SEL students will be working on using their manners and being polite and will continue learning what to do if they are being bullied and also learn how NOT to be a bully. Classes will work on learning and practicing RESPECT to everyone including themselves, school mates, teachers, siblings and parents. Healthy eating and hygiene will also be topics that we will explore. Students will continue practicing self control and how to control their emotions.

> For the rest of the school year, students will be learning how to save and download different file types. They will also be learning basic coding and how to do animation and comic book panels.

We also will be working on increasing our heart strength through cardiovascular activities including jumping rope. #### Grade 11-12 Ferris State Dual Enrollment Courses

11th Grade (1st hour, 4th quarter) ENGL 150: Basic Collegiate Writing:
An introduction to college writing strategies and skills through guided practice and instruction in prewriting through revision stages in composition. How to use writingsupport systems, establish a writing portfolio, and develop analytic skills. (King)

#### 11th Grade (1st hour, 1st quarter)

*College Study Methods*: This college methods course will assist students in the development and use of effective and efficient study strategies that can be utilized in college courses. Students will learn about goal-setting and selfmonitoring, learning styles, test preparation and test-taking, lecture and textbook note taking, time management and concentration, and general strategies for more efficient learning. (Cito)

#### 12th grade (one semester)

*MUST 221: Music Appreciation:* Elements of music and historical developments of Western "Classical" or "Art Music." Designed to expand the music listening experience through awareness in technique of listening. Listening and awareness of selected recordings, readings, and attending concerts. (Difatta) 11th Grade (1st hour, 3rd quarter) Math 110 Fundamentals of Algebra:

An introductory course in algebra covering linear equations, exponents, polynomials, factoring, solving quadratic equations by factoring, rational expressions, solving linear systems of equations, and applications. Integrated into the course at appropriate points are the following topics of arithmetic: prime factoring, GCF, LCD, numerical fractions, and signed number. (Oppat)

#### 12th grade (one semester)

*MTH 115*: A study of complex fractions, first and second degree equations and inequalities, exponents, radicals, and introduction to complex numbers, logarithms, and systems of equations. Meets General Education requirements for Quantitative Literacy.

Prerequisite: MTH 110 (Oppat)

#### 12th grade (one semester)

*READ 176 :* Improve students\' analytical reading ability and reading efficiency as needed for advanced college-level material; Critical comprehension skills, such as making inferences, distinguishing between facts and opinions, recognizing biases, making critical judgements, understanding cultural differences, relating social systems and theories, and making critical judgments, are emphasized. These skills are designed to be applicable to texts in other college courses. Prerequisite: READ 175

#### (Difatta)

#### 12th grade (one semester)

*CARE 102*: This course will provide students with the opportunity to explore college programs, career options and employment viability. Students will discover how educational planning can help them with their lifelong career decision making process. Students will develop personal educational and career plans based on interests and skills using strength-based assessment. (King)

#### 12th grade (one semester)

*CARE 250:* To prepare students to become career ready by developing successful skills and strategies focused on writing resumes and cover letters. In addition, students will be connected with career resources on campus and around the community. (Cosnowski, Tolbert)

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- Algebra IB: Students will learn about Exponents and Exponential Functions, Polynomials and Factoring, Quadratic Functions, Solving Quadratic Equations and Working with Functions
- Geometry B: explores 2 and 3 dimensional shapes. We not only explore area, perimeter, surface area and volume, but we revisit properties learned in middle school, and with the skills learned in Geometry A, prove these properties in a logical argument, proof writing, the fundamentals of formal thinking.
- Algebra 2B: Students will learn about rational functions, exponential and logarithmic functions, as well as statistics and probability.
- College Algebra B: Finance, Functions, Linear Relationships, and Systems of Equations, geometry.
- Biology B: photosynthesis and cellular respiration, mitosis, meiosis, DNA and Protein Synthesis, Genetics and Heredity.methods of classification, animals, plants, protists and fungi, bacteria, natural selection and evolution.
- Chemistry B: States of Matter and Thermochemistry, Chemical Reactions, Bonding (Ionic and Covalent), Organic Chemistry
- Psychology: The Brain and nervous system, Hormones, Theories of Development, Psychological Disorders, Treatment
- World History B: Main goals are to prepare students for the ACT/SAT Standardized tests, and to foster an interest in World History. A part of each students grade is our daily bell work assignments. The bell work includes reading a social studies passage and answering ten questions pertaining to the selection. Five questions are standard recall of information and five questions focus on ideas and concepts. Reading passages such as these and answering questions are a major part of the standardized tests required for college entry. In World History B Third Trimester, the focus of learning begins with the origins of our modern world by studying World War One and World War Two and the rise of integrated international community.
- Government: The study of Government includes the function of Government at the local, state and national levels with regards specifically to the U.S. Constitution. In addition to the constitution, focus is on topics including Democracy, Federalism, Republic, Justice, Tyranny and more.
- US History B: World War I, Roaring 20s, Great Depression, World War II, Civil Rights Movement, Cold War, Korean & Vietnam Wars, 1980s, 1990s, Technology Revolution. Modern Times.
- English IB: Grammar, argument writing and analysis are taught through Hamlet and historic pieces of literature.
- English Comp: designed to help students develop better fundamentals for reading and writing skills. In this Course you'll study several types of writing, examine proper grammar usage, including punctuation and spelling. We will also, spend time focusing on the development of a 5 paragraph essay. Students will work consistently on providing evidence for essays and will be focusing on the concepts of citing the evidence that they find within their essays. By following the MLA guidelines to properly write an Essay.
- English 2B: Students work on daily grammar corrections with bell work. They also do a non-fiction unit which will include reading a short novel, current event articles, and select short stories. Students also do PSAT style reading and grammar lessons. There are vocabulary words for each unit that the students should be studying regularly.
- English 3B: Students will do daily grammar practice with DOLs as well as mini grammar lessons to reenforce key grammar concepts. Students will also prepare for the SAT and specifically practice SAT essay writing. There will also be a reading unit on the novel *Their Eyes Were Watching God*.
- ELA Skills & Strategies (11th grade): this course is designed to prepare students for the SAT and future academic courses. Focus is on building reading skills including close reading, reading for information, analyzing an author's argument, claims and evidence, main idea and details, and critical thinking and reasoning. After SAT, we will practice all of these skills while analyzing various films.
- English 4B: daily grammar practice, college level writing and reading skills, and reading units which include <u>The Hate You Give</u>
